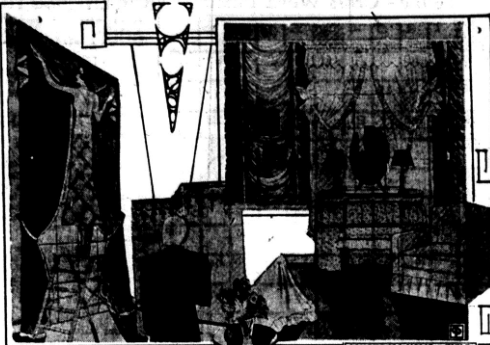

HOOVER VETOES BILL PROMPTLY

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(U. P.)—President Hoover today sent to congress a prompt and vigorous veto of the \$2,125,000,000 Wagner-Garner unemployment relief bill. The president's veto message was dispatched from the White House less than 10 minutes after the bill, passed by both houses in defiance of Mr. Hoover's relief views, was received from congress.

Mr. Hoover said the Wagner-Garner bill "violates every sound principle of public finance and of government."

"Never before has an dangerous suggestion been seriously made to our country," the president said.

Mr. Hoover urged enactment of a compromise relief bill which, he said, should be based built around the following proposals he had made previously. These proposals Mr. Hoover said, should embrace:

"First: Title I of H. R. 12465, the act now under consideration covering provisions for loans to states in amount of \$200,000,000 for the care of distress in states where needed.

"Second: Title III of this act, with the provision made applicable to all parts of the title except for roads and trails, that such works shall not shall not be initiated except on certificate of the secretary of the treasury that the funds necessary are available and can be obtained without interference with the current financing operations of the government.

"Third: That there should be substituted for title II the substance of the provisions in the substitute bill introduced by Senator Wagner and passed by the senate, of senate bill 4422, introduced by Senator Barbour or section four of the substitute bill introduced by Representative Wagner. And that these provisions not only loans for construction work of projects of self liquidating character but also essential aids to agriculture.

"Fourth: That the corporation

be authorized to increase its issue of capital by \$1,800,000,000 for these purposes.

"With the utmost seriousness," Mr. Hoover said, "I urged the congress to enact a relief measure, but I cannot approve the measure before me fraught as it is with possibilities of misfeasance and special privileges, so impracticable of administration, so dangerous to public credit and so damaging to our whole conception of governmental relations to the people as to bring far more distress than it will cure."

Of the provision to expend \$222,000,000 on public works, Mr. Hoover said:

"I have expressed myself at various times upon the extreme unsustainability of increasing expenditure on non-productive public works beyond the \$500,000,000 of construction already in the budget. It is an ultimate burden upon the taxpayer."

It unbalances the budget after all our efforts to attain that object. It does not accomplish the purpose in creating employment for which it is designed, as is shown by the reports of the technical heads of the bureau concerned that the annual direct employment under this program would be less than 100,000 out of the 5,000,000 unemployed.

Outlining his opposition to the "industrial loan program," the president's message continued:

"This expansion of authority of the Reconstruction Corporation would mean loans against security for any conceivable purpose on any conceivable security to anybody who wants money. It would place the government in private business in such fashion as to violate the very principle of public relations upon which we have built our nation, and renders insecure its very foundations."

CADILLAC, July 11.—(U. P.)—A double funeral will be held tomorrow for Mrs. E. L. Metheny and her son, E. R. Metheny, 49, of Buffalo, N. Y., who dropped dead yesterday after his arrival at his mother's funeral.

PERFUMED HOSE

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(U. P.)—Perfumed hosiery is the newest thing offered mildly. And those scented with narcissus are the favorite. The commerce department reported today that in a recent test four pairs of hose were shown to 250 women—just as it came from the factory—and three others scented very faintly.

The perfume was so faint that only 4 per cent concurred in noticed it but 60 per cent said they liked the narcissus pair best. Twenty-four per cent chose the pair perfumed with a fruit mixture, 18 per cent picked those scented with scariet; and only 8 per cent picked the unperfumed pair.

MURDERER SHOT AT SOUTH BEND

SOUTH BEND, IND., July 11.—(U. P.)—James Storey, 26, who was sought as the murderer of Jay N. Davis, married at North Baltimore, Ohio, Saturday night, was shot and perhaps fatally wounded by South Bend police here today. Storey was wounded while fleeing from police after being captured and handcuffed.

2 RACING DEATHS

AKRON, O., July 11.—(U. P.)—Samuel M. Gibson, 25, Youngstown, O., was burned to death yesterday when his racing automobile crashed through a fence during a 27 1/2 mile race. Heat of the flames prevented witnesses from rescuing the driver.

CADIZ, O., July 11.—(U. P.)—Carl F. Dawson, 24, Cambridge, O., was thrown from his auto and killed during the 50-mile feature race yesterday.

The first in the class of three year olds is the Jersey owned by William Brown with 1180 lbs. milk and 45.5 lbs. fat. The second is a Jersey owned by James Harris with 1171 lbs. milk and 45.4 lbs. fat. The third cow is a Holstein owned by R. W. Lautner with 1159 lbs. milk and 45.4 lbs. fat.

The cows in the class of two year olds are all Jerseys owned by James Harris with records as follows: First, 988 lbs. milk and 44.7 lbs. fat. Second, 642 lbs. milk and 45.0 lbs. fat. Third, 1076 lbs. milk and 45.0 lbs. fat.
